HOW DO I FIND Daily Life Through History?

In-Library and Home (Remote Access with a valid LAPL Library card)

Daily Life Through History is available online at all LAPL locations and remotely from the LAPL website within the **Research & Homework** alphabetical online resources list, under the subject categories of *History*, *Geography & Genealogy* and *Student Sources*, and in **Teen Web** under *Homework Help Sites / World History / LAPL Databases*.

DESCRIPTION:

In *Daily Life through History*, students and researchers discover the everyday details about past eras that make historical accounts relevant and meaningful. Browse daily life, divided into distinct time periods called **Eras:** Ancient W, 10,000 BCD – 500 CE, Medieval World, 500 CE – 1400 CE, Renaissance, 15th & 16th Centuries, Exploring New Lives, 17th & 18th Centuries, Revolutionary & Industrial Lives, 19th Century, and Modern World, 1900 – Present, and find out what it was like. Where did people live, study, and play? What did they eat, wear, and think?

A collection of primary documents, reference works, monographs, images, maps, illustrations and time lines depicting essential activities of daily life across the globe and throughout history are interwoven. The content focuses on history, social studies, humanities, and social sciences resources for scholars, students, teachers, and librarians in universities and secondary schools.

HOW TO BEGIN:



To Browse: The Explore <u>Eras</u> section offers in-depth investigation into a particular time period; choose one. Then select a general topic area from the list under the time period. Clicking on a topic takes the user to an **Overview** page where the navigation bar on the left-hand side lists topic-specific reference content from which you can choose. Each click builds the amount of information you are gathering with articles that you can print, e-mail or cite.

Searching for a specific answer? Enter your question into the <u>Ouick Search</u> box to see if it will bring up the desired information immediately.

<u>Advanced Searched</u> - limit your search further using lists of choices under four main options: *Categories*, *Eras*, *Regions*, and *Subjects*. Check the boxes that you want that will limit your search. You can also search across two other linked ABC-CLIO databases, *The African American Experience*, and *The Latino American Experience*, at the same time if suitable for your purposes.
