"Indie Author Day" Launches Digital Self-Publishing Platform SELF-e at Los Angeles Public Library's Central Library Saturday, Jan. 17, 1 - 5 p.m.

Event features insights from successful indie authors and tips for self-publishing; SELF-e helps indie authors and aspiring writers self-publish their works

Los Angeles, CA – Dec. 29, 2014 – All writers—whether aspiring or established—are invited to participate in "Indie Author Day," an event offering insights from successful independent authors, tips for self-publishing and insights from leaders in the self-publishing industry, to be held Saturday, Jan. 17, from 1 - 5 p.m. at Central Library, 630 W. "Indie Author Day" will also launch the Los Angeles Public Library's (LAPL) offering of SELF-e, an innovative digital self-publishing platform. LAPL is among the first library systems in the nation to make SELF-e available to its patrons. Created by *Library Journal* in collaboration with BiblioBoard®, SELF-e offers indie authors the opportunity to upload their e-books, expand their readership and broaden their fan base. It provides aspiring writers with the chance to upload their manuscript as an e-book and be discovered by a wide audience. Content submitted on the SELF-e platform will be evaluated by *Library Journal* and, if selected, appears in a curated collection of self-published e-books showcased at participating libraries nationwide.

SELF-e employs BiblioBoard's award-winning PatronsFirst[™] platform, which allows LAPL to make local authors' self-published e-books available to its cardholders and to any participating public library across the state. The e-books published on SELF-e do not have to be checked out or returned, like other library materials.

"With SELF-e, the library is providing writers an extraordinary resource to help them self-publish, promote, and gain a wider audience for their e-books. We look forward to welcoming L.A.'s diverse writing community to the launch of SELF-e at our 'Indie Author Day,' where people can learn firsthand about this new resource and how they can self-publish e-books."
