## **All 73 City Libraries to Re-Open Mondays Starting July 18, 2011**

***Mayor, Councilmembers, City Librarian and Students  
to Launch Service at Press Conference at  
Central Library, Monday, July 18, 9:30 a.m.***

**LOS ANGELES** (July 14, 2011) – Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and Councilmembers Eric Garcetti, Jan Perry, Bernard Parks and Tom LaBonge, City Librarian Martín Gómez and local students will launch the return of Monday service at all 73 city libraries at a press conference outside Central Library, 630 W. Fifth St., downtown Los Angeles on Monday, July 18, at 9:30 a.m. Measure L, a ballot initiative passed by voters last March, is providing the funds to restore library service on Mondays.

The mayor and city councilmembers who spearheaded Measure L will be joined by Library Commission President Dr. Tyree Wieder, Library Foundation of Los Angeles co-chair Jeff Brown and other dignitaries for the opening. Students from Noble Avenue Elementary School in West Hills and the Ramon C. Cortines High School for Visual and Performing Arts in downtown will also participate.

The city's 73 libraries were closed Mondays and service hours slashed to their lowest level in the library's 140-year history in August 2010, following cuts to the library budget. Voter-approved Measure L gradually restores library service hours to the 2009 level over the next four years by increasing the Library's share of City funding without new taxes.

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“Over the past two decades, Los Angeles has built one of the great library systems of the world and I’m pleased we are able to restore Monday services,” Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa said. “Whether you're in search of after-school programs, literacy classes, employment services, tutoring, or your favorite literary classic, Angelenos again have the opportunity six days a week to visit one of our many City libraries and take advantage of these important resources.”

City Librarian Martín Gómez said, “In the March election, the people of Los Angeles affirmed that libraries are critical to our neighborhoods and need to be open. I’m proud that we are fulfilling our pledge to voters and taking the first step in restoring library service hours within the first few weeks of the new fiscal year. Fully restoring service over the next four years is a top priority for the Los Angeles Public Library.”

“I am thrilled to see our libraries once again open on Mondays, and believe this a victory to be celebrated by all Angelenos,” said Councilmember Bernard C. Parks, who proposed and led the effort to create Measure L. “By voting to guarantee libraries a higher share of property tax revenue, residents of Los Angeles have shown their commitment to maintaining the library system and expressed the value they place on this critical city service.”

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Re-opening libraries on Mondays restores access to the Library's valuable resources that help people find jobs, do research, receive free homework help, take free literacy and computer classes and access the Web through library computers and free wi-fi. Monday service also benefits students. In addition to operating the city's largest after-school program, the library helps students succeed in school with programs for college prep, homework tutoring, literacy building skills and by providing a safe adult-supervised place for students to do their homework.

"By reopening our libraries on Mondays, we reopen the doors of opportunity for thousands of children and families who look to their local library as a place of learning, safety, and community," said Council President Eric Garcetti, who also served on the campaign committee. "I was proud to co-author Measure L to ensure our libraries continue to serve Angelenos for generations to come."

Council President Pro Tempore Jan Perry, who served on the Measure L campaign committee and in whose district the Central Library is located, said, "When voters passed Measure L, they said loud and clear that they believed in the important role that libraries play in our neighborhoods; they serve as a place for learning, a safe place for children and their families, and an important community gathering space. I am proud to join my colleagues in celebrating the re-opening of city libraries on Mondays and in supporting our libraries so that future generations can continue to enjoy this valuable community resource."

Councilmember Tom LaBonge who introduced the council motion that placed the measure on the ballot and served on the campaign committee, said, "A big thanks to the people of Los Angeles for passing Measure L, which ensures the funding for restoring hours at our city libraries. 'L' stands for libraries and 'L' stands for love. The passage of Measure L proves that we in Los Angeles love our libraries."

The Los Angeles Public Library serves the largest and most diverse population of any library in the nation.
