It was P-22's miraculous journey across two of Los Angeles' busiest freeways and incredible story of survival against all odds that first captured the imagination of Angelenos and people from all over the world and gave life to the #SaveLACougars campaign that is now building the Wallis Annenberg Wildlife Crossing.
